

CALL FOR SUBMISSIONS: WORLD OF SEABIRDS

Seabirders live and work in some incredible places. As we prepare for the Third World Seabird Conference, the WSU Early Career Scientists' Committee is shining a spotlight on some of these places in a series we're calling "World of Seabirds."

We're asking seabird researchers to submit videos documenting unique aspects of your field sites. What do they look like? What birds (and people) inhabit them? Where do the birds (and people) live? What equipment do you use in your research activities? What kinds of threats are your subjects experiencing? What aspects of everyday life in the field most surprise, challenge, or inspire you?

You can submit either a longer video (5-10 minutes) providing a comprehensive tour, or a shorter video (1-2 minutes) focusing on one particularly interesting aspect of your location or work. Beginning in the autumn of 2019, we will post these videos regularly on the World Seabird Union YouTube channel, along with live Q&A sessions with the scientists from featured videos. Whether or not you submit a video, we hope you will join the conversation and learn more about seabird colonies around the world!
